2020 Dates for your Diary



The Royal Society of Tasmania Library receives significant donation of Antarctic literature


As a 12-year-old boy living in Malaya, Gordon Bain, was intrigued by the harsh, wild and mysterious place called Antarctica. It was another 32 years before his dreams were fulfilled when Gordon voyaged south 12 times by ship, working with the Australian Antarctic Division, to the place that had existed only in his imagination. Gordon has been collecting

and reading Antarctic literature for most of his life, where the narratives of science, heroism and quests are played out. He has now donated the collection which totals over 750 fiction and non-fiction books to the Society's Library. (See picture top left of Gordon Bain delivering one of the many boxes

Antarctica is a place that very few people experience directly, so analysing the imaginative stories we tell about it is an important part of understanding our relationship with the continent.






Juliet Beale, the Honorary Librarian for the Collection and senior staff member at UTAS Library, says "the value in collections such as these is that researchers can see the entirety and range of the collection at once. There are some unusual and rare

titles in the collection as well as popular titles and having them all together in a

print collection highlights the breadth and depth of literature on Antarctica."

As part of a longstanding agreement between the University and the Society, UTAS Library houses, manages, conserves and provides access to the Society's library collection for all members.

The Gordon Bain collection will be housed on Level 5 of the Morris Miller Library with the University's Special and Rare Collections.



Maria Lord: convict to governor's lady

This year's Christmas lecture was delivered by Dr Alison Alexander (pictured right). Alison is a seventh-generation Australian, with convict ancestors in the first, second and third fleet. She was formerly a lecturer in history at the University of Tasmania, and is the editor of *The Companion to Tasmanian History* and the author of *The Ambitions of Jane Franklin*. She



was awarded the 2014 Australian National Biography Award for *The ambitions* of Jane Franklin: Victorian lady adventurer, a biography of Jane Franklin.

From her 1986 book, *Governors ladies*, Dr Alexander recounted the fascinating story of the naval officer Edward Lord and the convict Maria Riseley, who made a fortune in early Hobart Town by their cunning business and networking skills – only to lose it in the 1820s by Edward's extravagance and financial

incompetence.




Born to illiterate parents in 1778, Maria was the eldest of 10. Tried in 1802 at Surrey Assizes for stealing from a dwelling, Maria was transported for seven years, reaching Sydney in the *Experiment* on 24 June 1804. While working in the Female Factory at Parramatta, Edward Lord chose Maria from a line-up of women to be his servant. Although no illustrations of Maria exist, a portrait of Edward is seen left.


Thus, began the fascinating story of one of Tasmania's most successful business women.

Dr Lehman is currently a McKenzie Post-Doctoral Fellow at the School of Culture and

Communication, University of Melbourne. Descended from the Trawulwuy people of the North East, he is an award-winning curator and writer. His creative and scholarly works explore the impact of colonisation on Tasmania's

social fabric and Aboriginal contributions to Tasmania's environmental history and sense of place.




