The idea for a comprehensive dictionary of the English language first arose with the Royal Society in 1664 - a committee was formed and there was considerable

enthusiasm for the project. However, finding the right person proved difficult and the idea was shelved. It was not until 1746 that a group of London

booksellers approached Samuel Johnson and asked him to begin work on a dictionary. Johnson thought he could complete the task in three years - it took him seven, working single-handedly! But the result was a masterpiece and it


Biography: Susannah Fullerton, OAM,

Susannah also gives talks at libraries, schools, the Art Gallery of NSW and State Library of NSW on many other famous writers, such as Pepys, Oscar Wilde, the Brontës, Dickens, Trollope and many more. She has written *Brief Encounters: Literary Travellers in Australia* about famous authors visiting Australia, and has also written and recorded two audio CDs, *Finding Katherine Mansfield* and *Poetry to Fill a Room*. Susannah also leads literary tours to the UK, France, Italy, Scandinavia, NZ and America for Australians Studying Abroad.

It is always appreciated when our members commit their skills and experience to furthering the aims of our Society in the advancement of knowledge.

Grateful thanks are extended to all those who worked hard behind the scenes in the organisation of the Annual General Meeting and the preparation of the Annual Report.

The Annual General Meeting was very well attended, with 90 members and guests, and many positive comments on the new venue. Warm thanks were extended to outgoing President, Prof. Ross Large AO, and the 2019 Council who worked so hard on behalf of the Society.

New **President**, **Mrs Mary Koolhof** (pictured right) was pleased to show the audience a new item for the Society's rooms: a specimen of each of the Society's medals beautifully framed for members to view up close and admire. The Society is thankful to Dr John Thorne for organising this lovely item.

The guest speaker was **Dr Jean-Philippe Beaulieu** (pictured left) who spoke about *The Secret Garden at Recherche Bay - 1792*. Under the command of Vice Admiral Antoine Bruni d'Entrecasteaux, two ships, the 'Recherche' and the 'Esperance' with 218 men on board, left Brest, France, in 1791 on their

mission to locate and rescue the lost explorer La Pérouse and his two ships. They then travelled to Tenerife, the Cape of Good Hope and from there across the Indian Ocean for three months to land in Van Diemen's Land. They were hoping to land at Adventure Bay, but it was determined that Recherche Bay was a perfect anchorage for necessary ship repairs



from the foreign lands dried and pressed plant specimens as well as live ones in Wardian cases and woven baskets with protective covers to show the diversity of Tasmanian plants, such as casuarina, grevillea and eucalyptus. In addition, over three days and with the assistance of two other men, Lehaye prepared a 7m square garden bed (the 'secret



and replenishment of fresh water and supplies.

It was on 23 April 1792, that the gardener Felix Lehaye stepped ashore at Recherche Bay in Van Diemen's Land. The gardner's role was to supply the local indigenous people with European plant seeds and implements and to bring back




garden') in which they planted a range of vegetable seeds, such as radish, celery, cabbages, turnips and potatoes. As the soil was difficult to dig, they also spread many seeds throughout the surrounding woodland.

Whilst still searching for La Pérouse, the ships virtually circumnavigated Australia, the top of Papua New Guinea and Vanikoro, returning to Recherche Bay in 1793. Unfortunately, due to hungry wildlife, dry weather and dry, hard soil, few plants had germinated in the secret garden. However, some potatoes were able to be dug and removed. The crew intermingled amicably with the Lyluequonny People and often ate together and played simple games. The crew also conducted experiments in geomagnetism whilst at the Bay.



Dr Beaulieu continued his interesting presentation recounting events and futher history of Lehaye.

As a thank-you gesture, Dr Beaulieu was presented with a copy of the Society's beautiful publication, *The Library at the End* of the World by President Mary Koolhof (see left).

Nominations for the 2020 Prime Minister's Prizes for Science are now open.



Each year the Australian Government honours Australia's scientists, innovators

and science teachers through the PM's Prizes. Recipients share in \$750 000 prize money across seven prizes – two \$250 000 prizes for science and innovation; three \$50 000 prizes for early to mid-career researchers and innovators; and two \$50 000 prizes for teaching in primary and secondary schools.

Nominations are open from 6 February – 12 March 2020.


